| TSHOMBE | No. I report all my income, then I'll have to pay too much in taxes. |
| CATHY | Mr. Gabriel, taxes aren't meant to punish you. They help run the country. They pay for important things like schools, roads and even the police. So it's important that you're completely honest with the IRS. |
| TSHOMBE | I understand, but don't you see? I can't afford to be honest. |
| CATHY | You can't afford to break the law either. If you don't pay all of your taxes, you could be in big trouble. The IRS can charge you with civil fraud or tax evasion. |

| CATHY | That means that you lied so you didn't have to pay taxes. The IRS can charge you a big fine and they can send you to prison. I suggest you tell the truth. |

## Taxes

Taxes are the money that people pay to support the government. How much you pay in taxes depends on how much money you make a year. The local library has information on community service centers that help with taxes. You can use the services of a tax advisor or an accountant to help you file your taxes. You can also get free advice on the Internet. There are some important
things to remember when filing your taxes. It is important that you keep all your financial records in order. Receipts will be important in case you need to prove how much you spent. It is also important to file the correct number of dependents. You may claim relatives in other countries if they make less than $\$ 2,800$ and receive at least half of their support from you. If you pay for your own health insurance, you may deduct a percentage of what you pay. The IRS will sometimes give you a second chance to correct the mistakes you made in filing your taxes. But remember, if you break the law and don't pay your taxes you could get into big trouble. The IRS will charge you with tax evasion. You will have to pay fines and may be sent to jail.

## Count and Non-Count Nouns

Nouns are words we use in English to name people, places, animals, things, or ideas. There are two types: count nouns and non-count nouns.

Count nouns are nouns you can count. They usually take an $\mathbf{s}$ or es for the plural. For example: one table, two chairs, three books. Non-count nouns are nouns you cannot count. For example: lemonade, water, oil. For these you could count the containers instead. For instance: two glasses of lemonade, three bottles of water, a gallon of oil.
